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Festival Cancellation Policy:

Should the Festival have to cancel sessions for unforeseen circumstances (adjudicator unable to arrive, weather events, power outage, etc.), **no refunds will be issued.**In such an event, the coordinator of each discipline will have the authority to cancel one or more sessions, in consultation with the Festival President.

The coordinator will notify volunteers and teachers/schools of the cancellation as appropriate.

DANCE ENTRY DEADLINE: - January 31, 2024.

The Coordinator **WILL** receive entry forms by this date.

LATE ENTRIES: - entries submitted after the closing date may be accepted until February 10th, 2024. They WILL include a late entry fee of \$10.00 per entry in addition to the regular entry fee.

Dance Music Submission DEADLINE: - March 15, 2024

Music received after that date may disqualify your participation.

ALL OTHER DISCIPLINE DEADLINES: -FEBRUARY 10, 2024.

LATE ENTRIES: - entries submitted after the closing date may be accepted until February 17, 2024. They WILL include a late entry fee of \$10.00 per entry in addition to the regular entry fee.

All copyrights regarding music and printed text will be observed. See General Rules, 8.

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It is the responsibility of each participant to read and comply with all rules governing this festival.

The Nelson Musical Festival Rules may differ from the Performing Arts BC Rules. Please refer to their syllabus if considering a nomination for their festival.

GENERAL RULES

- 1. The Festival is open to all participants, according to classification and conformity with rules.
- 2. Participants, unless otherwise stated, are to be amateurs only. The term amateur shall mean one whose principal income is not derived from musical services. This does not apply to conductors of choirs or to those bonafide students of music who teach music to use the money so earned to further their musical education. The same conditions apply to the Speech Arts and Dance classes.
- 3. Participants in Choirs, Orchestras, and Dance Groups will be bonafide members of their respective organizations.
- 4. The participant WILL enter their age on the entry form for classes where the age limit is specified. The acceptable age for such classes shall be as of January 1st. (For example, a participant aged ten on January 1st but turning 11 between the date and the Festival opening will still be eligible to participate in the ten years and under-class.) Where the term "Open" is used, there is no restriction as to age.
- 5. No entrant: solo, duos, trios and quartets, may participate in more than one similar class in each section where the age limit is set. Exceptions are vocal or instrumental ensembles and dance groups.
- 6. A participant may not use the same selection in a subsequent year.
- 7. Entries for all classes will be received by the Festival Committee on the Official Entry Form together with the entry fee on or before the noted deadline. Entry Fees shall be made payable to the NELSON MUSICAL FESTIVAL ASSOCIATION. No entries will be accepted unless accompanied by an entry fee. The Entry Fee is not returnable if entry is withdrawn after the registration deadline. Entries submitted after the closing date may be accepted up to a noted late fee deadline and WILL include a late entry fee of \$10.00 per entry in addition to the regular entry fee.
- 8. The Federation of Canadian Music Festivals has now deemed it permissible to use photocopies for page turns AS LONG AS THE ORIGINAL COPY IS PRESENT AT THE PERFORMANCE. This does not mean that the adjudicator has the original and the performer the photocopy. There will be two original copies present in the performance hall. PARTICIPANTS ATTEMPTING TO USE UNAUTHORIZED COPIES OF COPYRIGHTED MATERIAL WILL BE DISQUALIFIED. All copyrights regarding music and printed text will be observed. Manual copies of copyrighted material will not be accepted. The accompanist will perform from an original score in music classes, and the adjudicator will be given a completely original score of music under copyright. If original scores are not available, a publisher's letter is required giving permission for copying. If the selection is in the public domain, a letter confirming this fact is needed from the publisher and their consent to copy. The use of music downloaded from the Internet is permissible so long as receipts for the number of copies downloaded accompany it. If membership in a download site provides free use of the material downloaded, the participant will provide proof of membership.
- a. The title and composer (or author in the case of Speech Arts) of the chosen piece and length of its performance time will be stated on the Official Entry Form. No substitutions, additions, or deletions are permitted after the closing date.
 - b. PARTICIPANTS WILL DELIVER TO THE FESTIVAL ASSISTANT A COPY OF THEIR PIECE INDICATED WITH A BOOKMARK UPON WHICH HAS BEEN PENCILLED AT THE TOP THE CLASS NUMBER AND PARTICIPANT'S NUMBER ACCORDING TO THE PROGRAM BEFORE CLASS PERFORMANCE.


 THE USE OF PHOTOCOPIES IS STRICTLY LIMITED. SEE COPYRIGHT RULE No 8.
 - c. In "Own Choice" selection, the adjudicator will consider its suitability and artistic value.
- 10. The participant will perform their piece in the key in which it is set under arrangements in the edition prescribed. The memorizing of pieces is recommended but not compulsory.
- 11. The Festival Committee will decide how the classes are to be taken and arrange the order in which participants will be heard. The Committee reserves the right to subdivide or cancel a class should the number of entries warrant.
- 12. Set up of festival venues provided by the Committee for any scheduled performance shall be deemed appropriate for the duration of the discipline involved. No changes to the setup of venues shall be permitted without the consent of a Festival Assistant.

- 13. Participants' teachers will notify them regarding the place, date, and time of their participation and order of involvement. In cases where there is no teacher, the coordinator will inform the participants by phone.
- 14. Participants will be designated to perform by entry number and commence at the adjudicator's request. The adjudicator may terminate any performance at will.
- 15. With the exception of Dance, participants are encouraged to announce their piece from the stage either before they begin or before each selection they perform.
- 16. With the exception of Dance, participants in each class will remain seated in the seats reserved for them until adjudication of the particular class.
- 17. a. If called upon by the Committee, participants will be expected to perform at any EVENING SESSION during the Festival, including the Highlights Concert, and will be so prepared.
 - b. The Committee and Adjudicators reserve the right to selection of performers for the Highlights Concerts.
- 18. For Provincial Festival recommendations, we quote from the PABC Syllabus. "To avoid controversy, the selection of participants will be the sole responsibility of the adjudicators."
- 19. The Adjudicator's decision in all matters of adjudication shall be final and without appeal. Awards will be given at the Adjudicator's discretion.
- 20. A participant's, teacher's, or parent's communication with the adjudicator regarding a participant or a performance is inappropriate. Any such communication with the adjudicator may result in the participant's disqualification. Any protests arising shall be made in writing to the Festival Secretary, not to the Adjudicator.
- 21. All Award Categories are to be approved by the Festival Committee. The Committee will give First Choice for awards and Provincial Finals recommendations to those students whose permanent residence is in our geographic area. You live in our geographic area if the highway distance between your home and Nelson is less than the highway distance between your home and any other affiliated Performing Arts Festival.



Liability Waiver

The Nelson Musical Festival Association (the 'NMFA') is not responsible for any claims, demands or damage to musical instruments, equipment, props, or any other personal property. The NMFA's acceptance of a participant's application for entry into the Kootenay Festival of the Arts will release any responsibility of the NMFA or volunteers for the NMFA from claims, demands, damages, actions or causes, or actions arising out of, or in consequence of, any loss, injury or damage to any participant or any participant's personal property incurred while attending or participating in the Kootenay Festival of the Arts. This clause shall also apply to all members of the public attending any/all events.



Festival etiquette is expected

As an audience member for the Festival of the Arts performances, you are an important participant!

Every artist requires an appreciative audience in order to perform well.

Your cooperation during performances is appreciated by all.

Please enter or exit the performance hall between classes only, remain seated and refrain from talking during classes, and keep small children quiet and seated with you.

No videos, audio recordings or photographs may be taken during performances, adjudications, etc.

Silence all cell phones and any other noise-making/electronic devices.

Kootenay Festival of the Arts reserves the right to take official photographs at appropriate times for archival and publicity purposes.

We encourage you to recognize all participants on completion of their performances, and to make them feel happy that you were there to watch them. Applause is encouraged at the very END of each participant.

A point to remember: Participants who are scheduled late in a morning, afternoon, or evening session can be discouraged if the majority of the audience has left.

If your schedule possibly permits it, please stay until the end of the session.

SUPPLEMENTARY RULES:

1. Time Limits: entries are not to exceed -

Solos: 3 minutes Trios: 5 minutes
Duos: 5 minutes Groups: 7 minutes
Production Number 12 minutes

2. Age Categories: (As of December 31st before the upcoming Provincial Festival)

Duo & Trio categories – enter the class of oldest member

Group category – age is determined by adding the ages of all dancers and dividing by the number of dancers in the group. Totals ending in ".5" or higher are rounded up to the next age level.

* On a Group entry form, all members of the group and their ages will be listed.

- 3. Music requirements: Please note that music will be submitted digitally recorded as a ".mp3" or ".m4a" file. Dancers will also need to provide a backup copy of all their music on a CD or thumb drive. The performer is responsible for ensuring that copies of recorded music comply with all copyright restrictions that apply to the source material.
- 4. Limited sets and props are suggested where allowed. All props will be an integral part of the performance and can be handled by the participant without assistance.
- 5. All performances will be in age-appropriate costumes.
- 6. Lip-synching is only permitted in Theatrical Dance and Variety.
- 7. Live singing is only permitted in Song, and Dance,
- 8. Lyrics are not allowed in Ballet categories, except for Contemporary Ballet. Vocalization (humming, chanting, etc.) is acceptable.
- 9. In all Modern categories, lyrics, music with vocalization, vocalization without music, and the spoken word are permitted. It is recommended that every effort be made to select a musical piece that is stylistically appropriate to the Modern discipline.
- 10. Bare feet or socks are only permitted in Modern Dance and Interpretive Modern. No formal dance footwear is permitted in Contemporary or Interpretive Contemporary. Footwear integral to the choreographic intent of the dance may be used.
- 11. Any reference to violent, derogatory, or sexual content or language will not be permitted, and use of such will result in disqualification.
- 12. A participant may not use the same dance in a subsequent year.
- 13. Duos, trios, and groups will be submitted on one entry form with all names and festival ages listed.
- 14. The adjudicator's decisions regarding awards and provincial nominees will be final. The adjudicator may choose to select Junior, Intermediate, Senior, and Provincial Excellence participants to represent our Festival at the provincial level, provided all requirements have been met for both Performing Arts BC and the Kootenay Festival of the Arts. Please be advised that an adjudicator can also choose NOT to nominate a dancer even though they have met the stated requirements if they feel the dancer is not ready to compete at the Provincial level. The adjudicator may also select Merited Participants from the same groups to attend the Provincial Festival as a Merited Participant, not a participant.
- 15. The performer is responsible for ensuring that copies of recorded music comply with all copyright restrictions that apply to the source material.

ELIGIBILITY: Please be advised that those participants interested in qualifying for a provincial nomination will have performed a MINIMUM of 2 solos within the SAME CATEGORY of Ballet, Modern, or Stage and have received a mark of 85 or better in at least 2 of those solos.

Candidates WILL also participate in the Provincial Technique Class/Workshop of said category.

Please be aware that the dance syllabus of the Kootenay Festival of the Arts is not necessarily the same as the provincial syllabus, and for further information regarding provincials click on the link to the Performing Arts BC website.

IT IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF EACH PARTICIPANT TO READ AND COMPLY WITH ALL RULES GOVERNING THIS YEAR'S FESTIVAL.

BALLET CATEGORIES

<u>DEMI POINTE CLASSICAL</u>: based on any method of classical technique (Vaganova, Cecchetti, RAD, etc.), soft shoes, no sets permitted; one handheld prop may be used if integral to the dance.

<u>POINTE CLASSICAL</u>: based on any method of classical technique (Vaganova, Cecchetti, RAD, etc.), pointe shoes, no sets permitted; one handheld prop may be used if integral to the dance.

NEO CLASSICAL BALLET: based on any method of classical technique (Vaganova, Cecchetti. RAD. etc.) in the 20th and 21st Century style. Original Choreography should be plotless and musically driven without narrative or mime. Dancer's movements should be the primary artistic medium.

<u>CONTEMPORARY BALLET</u>: incorporates classical ballet techniques with a greater range of movements that may not adhere to strict body lines for classical ballet. This style includes non-traditional movements such as more relaxed steps, floor work and turned in legs, etc., to portray the concept of being more innovative, free and earthbound. The physical interpretation of the theme that the choreographer envisioned allows for more expressive emotions and feelings. Music with lyrics permitted.

<u>DEMI-CHARACTER</u>: based on any method of classical technique. Dancer portrays a story/idea/concept/impression while performing ballet technique from the waist down and character from the waist up. One handheld prop may be used, provided they are an integral part of the dance.

<u>CHARACTER</u>: ballet technique with stylized movement. The dancer will portray a definite character (actual or fictitious) with the whole body but not tell a story. One handheld prop may be used provided they are an integral part of the dance

<u>NATIONAL CHARACTER</u>: a choreographed dance using authentic steps from any specified country. The name of the dance and the country will be stated on the entry form.

<u>INTERPRETIVE BALLET</u>: dancers may use any ballet technique as long as the body is the medium of expression, and the interpretation of the music, to portray an intangible thought or mood, real or imaginary. This genre should express an idea but not a story. No sets/props are permitted.

<u>TECHNIQUE CLASS/WORKSHOP – BALLET</u> – This class is REQUIRED for those dancers wishing to be considered for Provincial Recommendation.

The adjudicator will arrange Technique Classes. Female participants will wear pink tights, and a dark, solid coloured leotard and male participants will wear dark tights and a shirt or leotard in a light solid colour. Hair will be neatly groomed.

MUSIC INTERPRETATION: when registering in the Music Interpretation (Music chosen by Adjudicator) category, please note that there is only a <u>SOLO</u> Category in Music Interpretation.

MODERN CATEGORIES

<u>MODERN DANCE</u>: a stylized dance form with its foundations on a technically based discipline such as Graham, Limon, Cunningham, Humphrey, and Horton, etc. Dance that rejects the limitations of classical ballet; was formulated from natural rhythms and favours movement derived from contraction and release, breath, suspension, fall and recovery, and dynamism. Movement may or may not be related to the music.

INTERPRETIVE MODERN: dance that uses a recognized/codified modern technique to tell a story, express a feeling, interpret a character, behaviour, or emotional state. Movement should be related to the intent of the music.

CONTEMPORARY: free movement of dance expression encompassing various dance disciplines with modern as its underlying base, such as the choreography of William Forsythe, Wayne McGregor, Akram Khan, Ohad Narin (Gaga), Hofesch Shecter (Release Technique), etc. — a constantly evolving style of movement that explores and gives physicality to human ideologies, behaviours, and emotions, with emphasis on engaging the whole body.

<u>INTERPRETIVE CONTEMPORARY</u>: dance that uses contemporary movement vocabulary from stylized to pedestrian (with modern technique as its basis) to tell a story express a feeling, interpret a character, behaviour, or emotional state; e.g. Pina Bausch (Tanztheater Wuppertal). Movement should be related to the intent of the music, while the choreography will engage the whole body.

<u>TECHNIQUE CLASS/WORKSHOP – MODERN</u> – This class is REQUIRED for those dancers wishing to be considered for Provincial Recommendation.

The adjudicator will arrange Technique Classes. May wear any of the following: bodysuit, unitard, capris, fitted pants or shorts, footless tights, fitted tops or close-fitted tops for males. No loose tops. Hair securely fastened and neatly aroomed.

<u>MUSIC INTERPRETATION</u> – When registering in *Music Interpretation* (Music chosen by Adjudicator) category. Please note that there is only a <u>SOLO</u> Category in Music Interpretation.

STAGE DANCE CATEGORIES

SONG and **DANCE**: a routine suited to a stage production, Equal effort in dancing, singing, and acting will be an integral part of the overall performance—no pre-recorded vocals permitted, live vocals only.

THEATRICAL DANCE: dance suited to a stage production, a review, cabaret, etc. Contents will be predominately dancing; choreography should have a character base without straight-line work; it will be composed of a diversified vocabulary of steps and may utilize any dance genre. Live voice is not permitted. Lip-syncing is permitted.

JAZZ: dance technique based on isolation of the body and/or contraction release.

LYRICAL JAZZ: a dance that is generally performed to music in slower tempos and interprets the lyrics or intent of that piece of music. This form uses soft jazz technique and style utilizing facial and body emotions to portray an idea, story, mood or feeling.

<u>HIP- HOP/ STREET DANCE</u>: a constantly evolving form of dance that relies on individualism and personal style and emphasizes the expressive power of movement---should include but not be limited to choreography that incorporates a blend of contemporary funk and street style with jazz technique. May consist of moves such as gliding, popping, locking, waving, and utilizing house, old school, and new school. May also include gymnastics/power moves or any series of tricks or stunts as long as music, costumes, and lyrics are age appropriate.

TAP: arms are complementary and coordinated to the footwork. The rhythm of percussion is articulated through the feet and the entire body. The emphasis is on the clarity and shading of sounds, whether they are regular rhythm or syncopated. No dubbing of tap sounds is permitted in accompaniment.

ACROBATIC DANCE: combines dance technique with acrobatic elements to seamlessly blend the two. Dance should be 50% dance and 50% acrobatic movements. A simple prop (no mat) may be used if integral to the dance.

<u>TECHNIQUE CLASS/WORKSHOP – STAGE</u> – This class is REQUIRED for those dancers wishing to be considered for Provincial Recommendation.

The adjudicator will arrange Technique Classes. All dancers should wear a leotard or tight-fitting top and jazz pants or a unitard in a dark, solid colour. Hair neatly groomed.

<u>MUSIC INTERPRETATION</u> – When registering in *Music Interpretation* (Music chosen by Adjudicator) category. Please note that there is only a <u>SOLO</u> Category in Music Interpretation.

OTHER CATEGORIES

Please be advised that these categories are NOT eligible for Provincial Nominations

<u>CHOREOGRAPHY</u>: This is an original dance by entrants to the music of their choice. Entrants will be judged on originality of idea, development of the idea as a dance form, interpretation of music and style. **There should be no teacher involvement.** Written choreography notes (in point form) **WILL** be sent to the Discipline coordinator **two weeks** before the Festival.

Dancer's notes should include the following:

- inspiration
- reason for costuming choice
- reason for music choice
- · movements and counts are written out for the entire piece

If notes are not received, certificates will not be awarded, and the choreographer will receive adjudication only. Please indicate the choreographic discipline, i.e., Ballet (B), Modern (M), Stage (S).

DANCER'S OWN CHOREOGRAPHY: choreographed and danced by the choreographer.

Please note that there is only a <u>SOLO</u> category in Dancer's Own Choreography.

- 3. All participants will follow Rule 9 of the General Rules, repeated here:
 - a. The title and composer (or Author in the case of Speech Arts) of the chosen piece and length of performance time WILL BE STATED on the Official Entry Form. No substitutions, additions, or deletions are permitted after the closing date.
 - b. PARTICIPANTS WILL DELIVER TO THE FESTIVAL ASSISTANT A COPY OF THEIR MUSIC INDICATED WITH A BOOKMARK UPON WHICH HAS BEEN PENCILLED AT THE TOP THE CLASS NUMBER AND PARTICIPANT'S NUMBER ACCORDING TO THE PROGRAM.  - c. In "Own Choice" selection, the adjudicator will consider its suitability and artistic value.
- 4. As an aid to the adjudicators, participants will number the first bar of each line in their score.
 - a. Please have your name on the front cover of music books or scores. Insert, at the page of the performance piece, a strip of paper (provided) with the Class # and your Entry # at the top, so that it is visible when the book is closed.
 - b. Please give your book to the Adjudicator's Secretary when your class is called. Also, please be sure to collect your book or score after your adjudication.
- 5. A Highlights Concert with the Awards presentation will be held at the end of each half of the Festival. Participants who have received Certificates may be asked to perform at this concert. In choosing award winners, preference will be given to those participants who have received three Certificates of Merit.
- 6. The adjudicator may choose students to represent our festival at the provincial level in Junior, Intermediate, Senior, and Provincial Excellence classes. Preference will be given to participants who have received three Certificates of Merit.

PROVINCIAL ELIGIBILITY: Please be advised that those participants interested in qualifying for a provincial nomination will have performed in a minimum of 2 solo classes in the Piano division and have received a mark of 85 or better in at least 2 of those classes. If nominated to participate in the provincial festival, the nominees may also enter the Optional Parallel Canadian Class at their respective levels.

- 4. Each outstanding performance will be awarded a Certificate of Merit. In any class, the adjudicator may award several Certificates of Merit. However, if there are no exceptional performances in a class, no certificates will be awarded.
- 5. The adjudicator's decisions regarding awards and provincial nominees will be final. The adjudicator may choose students to represent our festival at the provincial level in Junior, Intermediate, Senior, and Provincial Excellence classes. Preference will be given to those participants who have performed in a minimum of three classes, including selections of Prose, Drama and Poetry.

COSTUMES and PROPS: Costuming and props are only permitted for the Drama selections and Shakespeare classes and will be integral to the selection. Participants should choose the material that requires a minimum of props; the props should be portable and capable of being set up in a minimum amount of time without assistance. All props and costumes are the sole responsibility of the participant. It is not intended that participants use elaborate costumes. Note: no live flame on stage is permitted.

DEFINITIONS: The following definitions have been established as guidelines for participants.

PROSE: In prose, the speaker is the narrator. The focus should be on the voice. Vocal characterization is encouraged, but the quality of prose will be maintained. The selection should include narration, description, and dialogue. It should be spoken in the story-telling style, not performed as a dramatic scene, i.e., there should be no acting and only minimal movement around the stage. Participants may stand or be seated

DRAMA: In drama, the speaker is the character. The selection should be taken from a play to be presented by an actor assuming the character's language, movement, and dress. The selection should be the words of one character only with words of other characters omitted. Shakespeare selections will be taken from his plays rather than his non-dramatic poetry. Movement, character development, and relationships are important in this section; thus, "stand-alone monologues" are are not a recommended choice.

POETRY: In poetry, the language is moulded into some kind of design; in prose, it is not. Performance choices should be matched to the author's intention and style.

Lyric – a short, unified poem expressing the poet's experience and emotion usually presented in a relaxed stance with no movement. The speaker interprets with it: e.g., Solitude by Bliss Carmen, To Autumn by Keats, Sonnets of Shakespeare and Wordsworth.

Narrative – a poem that tells a story and usually has dialogue; the telling of the story is the primary concern of the speaker: e.g. *The King's Breakfast* by A.A. Milne, *The Raven*, by E.A. Poe, *The Cattle Thief* by Pauline Johnson.

Dramatic – in a dramatic poem, a character distinct from the performer and the poet speaks, revealing personality and attitudes. The primary concern of the poem is to reveal character rather than tell a story: e.g. My Last Duchess by Robert Browning, Patterns by Amy Lowell.

Sonnet – a sonnet is a fixed poem, traditionally consisting of 14 lines of iambic pentameter with a set rhyme scheme.

Slam Poetry – idea or thematic connection poems with voice, humour, rhythm, exaggeration, and wordplay, written for performance to an audience. Excerpts may be presented, as these poems are often very long. Suggested resource books include Word Warriors (Olson), Take the Mic (Smith), Poetry Slam (Glazner).

CHORAL SPEAKING: Vocal interpretation of a poem by a group of voices. Voices should tone together resonantly and harmoniously. Single or smaller group voices interspersed could be used for nuance, texture, variety, and

dynamics. Speakers should have an emotional understanding of the rhythm (all speakers using the same rhythm), speaking as one in the chorus (blending of voices), and have imaginative vocal colour.

PROVINCIALELIGIBILITY: Please be advised that those participants interested in qualifying for a provincial nomination will have performed in a minimum of 2 solo classes in the Speech and Dramatic Arts division and have received a mark of 85 or better in at least 2 of those classes. If nominated to participate in the provincial festival, the nominees may enter the Optional Parallel Shakespeare Class.

The above rule does not apply to the Shakespeare Open Duo Class, where a participant will have participated in a Shakespeare Duo Class at the local level. Participants in this class need not participate in any other Speech Arts classes at the provincial festival but may attend just for this class.

In the Junior, Intermediate and Senior levels, a group may have a minimum of 3 and a maximum of 9 participants, each having their part. When a piano is included, the piano part will be original and not an orchestral reduction. There shall be no conductor. Instrumentation and amplification may be used but only as indicated in the original score. A complete score will be provided to the adjudicator and may not be an unauthorized photocopy.

CH-1: Average Age: 14 years and under, 3-9 performers, time limit: 20 minutes. Two contrasting selections.

CH-2: Intermediate Chamber Group Average age: 17 years and under, 3-9 performers, Time limit: 25 minutes. Two contrasting selections.

CH-3: Senior Chamber Group Average Age: 22 years and under, 3-9 performers, time limit: 30 minutes. Two contrasting selections.

For eligibility for the Provincial Festival, one of the selections will have been performed at the local level.

It is the responsibility of each participant to read and comply with all the rules governing the Provincial Festival.
